

Forest School

The observant amongst you will have spotted that the two teachers we trained to deliver forest school this year will no longer be with us in September. Having set up the area and resources and completed copious risk assessments and still very much believing in the value of Forest School for the children, we are looking at putting something in place for the Autumn term. This is likely to involve buying in a Forest school teacher for at least half a day a week. Negotiations with their company are ongoing. We also intend to train one of our own staff to be able to take this over further down the line. We are also looking to make more use of the outdoor area for low risk activities for each class throughout the year.
